- **Course Description:** This course examines basic properties of systems of linear equations, vector spaces, linear independence, dimension, linear transformations, matrices, determinants, eigenvalues, and eigenvectors. Students may not receive credit for both MATH 3130 and APPM 3310.
- **Prerequisites:** MATH 2400 Analytic Geometry and Calculus 3. MATH 3000 Introduction to Abstract Mathematics is helpful, but not required.

Examples of plagiarism include: failing to use quotation marks when directly quoting from a source; failing to document distinctive ideas from a source; fabricating or inventing sources; and copying information from computer-based sources, e.g., the Internet.
